Mosaic is an Ofsted "Outstanding School" (Ofsted 2015) and we are currently celebrating our 5th Anniversary Year, having welcomed our first Reception class in 2013. We were also designated an "Outstanding School" by Pikuach in 2015, the only Jewish schools inspection service fully accredited by the Department for Education. We are a vibrant, happy community, where we are committed to making a positive difference *to every single child*.

Teaching, Learning and Enrichment

Mosaic recognises the importance of preparing children for life in an ever-changing world. Our immersive curriculum is broad and balanced in order to prepare pupils for their entry to the secondary school of their choice. Our teachers have high expectations and give focused feedback to ensure pupils make excellent progress in line with and beyond national expectations. We also track all pupils for early identification of issues and create actions to address differences in attainment and ensure progress. We maximise pupil progress and attainment through flexibility and focusing on pupils' needs. Not every need is academic. We use extra-curricular activities to excite children, helping them to absorb knowledge and skills, and immerse them in what they are taught.

Community

If our children are the heart of the school, then it is our parents, educators and supporters who form its backbone. Over the past five years we have built a strong school community; "Friends of Mosaic" organises over 20 community-building and fundraising activities per year, and has so far raised over £30,000 for the school.

In continuing to build our school and community, we encourage the active involvement of our parents. This starts each school day when parents/carers are able to drop and collect their children directly to and from the classroom, encouraging daily contact with class teachers. On Friday's, parents/carers are invited to attend a special school assembly called Kabbalat Shabbat, where we learn to welcome the Jewish Sabbath and its concept of a day of rest and family togetherness.

I hope you enjoy your visit to Mosaic. It is a privilege to serve as the Headteacher of this unique school, which is regularly described by parents and visitors as a "hidden gem."

Reception Curriculum Overview

Helping your child at home

Please take every opportunity to talk, read, play games and count with your child. If your child has any special experiences or achievements out of school we would love to hear about them.

Reading

It is very important that your child reads regularly with you in order to become a confident reader. Children in the Early Years should try to do this every day. Every child in the school is provided with a reading diary. This is a booklet for parents to keep a record of when they listen to their child read. Please complete this record every time you hear your child read and send it back to the school in the book bag.

General

Please help us by making sure your child is in school by 8.45am every morning. This means they will have the opportunity to make the most of the learning experiences in school.

If your child has to be absent, please inform the office by calling 0208 944 8731 or sending an email by 8.45am the day they are absent. A good record of attendance and punctuality is very important if your child is to get the best out of their education.

Please make sure your child wears the proper school uniform. Children should not wear jewellery, other than stud earrings, watches, or jewellery worn for religious reasons. Sweets, chocolate and sugary drinks are not allowed in school as we are a healthy school. We would be grateful if children did not bring toys to school, as they tend to get lost. On Fridays we have 'show and tell' where children are welcome to bring 1 toy or object to show to their peers.

The school provides children with a fruit snack. Please do not put fruit snacks in children's bags unless they are going to an afterschool club.

Hebrew and Jewish Learning	As usual, we will follow the Torah stories and learn about key characters such as Abraham, Jacob and Joseph. We will also learn about the great Jewish hero Judah Maccabee! We will spend a week working on Hanuka; making our own dreidels, class decorations and cards! As 'Tikun Olam' is our value, we will be getting the children to contribute to 'Mitzuah Day' (Good Deed Day). Hebrew classes will be once a week and the children will learn family names.								
Personal Social and Emotional Development	Our weekly circle time takes enables us to embrace any concerns that the children might have, such as making friends or sharing toys. It is a very important time and the children are showing great respect for each other. Mitzvah day will								
Development	bring a focus on acts of kindness. Children will think about								
	what acts of kindness they can do to help others.								
Physical Development	Our P.E day is on Wednesday (please allow children to get themselves changed into their PE kits as this is part of their learning). We will be working on our fine motor skills through dough disco and table top activities. We will also do 'morning movement' with the children where we integrate physical activity with other aspects of the curriculum such as maths, topic etc.								
Communication and Language	We will be developing vocabulary around 'people who help us' (medics, fire-fighters, soldiers and police) through role play and small world and stories. We will be encouraging children to tell us stories through the use of puppets and turning our role play area into different places of work, e.g. a police station. Show and tell offers an opportunity for the children to speak confidently in front of a group, listen to each other and ask questions.								
Literacy	Our texts will link to our theme and we will initially be reading and writing superhero comic words. The children will look at non-fiction (information books) and discuss the difference between fiction and non-fiction books. We will also read Hanukah and Christmas stories as the term draws to a close. We will start 'phase 2' phonics this half term, where the children learn 19 letters of the alphabet and begin to blend (read) and segment (spell) with them. They will also learn some important 'tricky' words!								
Mathematics	The children are practising some mental maths on the carpet each morning after registration. They think about 'I more'

	and 'I less', '2 more' and '2 less' and how to use fingers or a number line – or a tool such as a number fan to work out the answer. We will be developing our understanding of concepts
	such as length, time and capacity through games like what's the time Mr wolf.
Understanding the World	Throughout this half term we will focus on key events and festivals such as Remembrance day, Diwali and Bonfire Night. We will also think about the different jobs that people to do to help us e.g. policeman, fire-fighters and nurses. Fire fighters will be visiting us at school, where the children will have the chance to use the hose and sit in the fire engine!
Express Arts and Design	We will be designing and making plenty of superhero costumes, modes of transport and acting out stories in the role play area. The role play area will change from a Super hero area to a fire station, police station, or a hospital and the children will help to make all the props! We will be making our own Diwali cards, police hero badges and many more. Singing and music continues to be a part of the everyday provision in the Early Years along with a weekly music lesson and assembly.
VISITS	We will be visiting Wandsworth fire station on the 7 th November.

Additional

Homework will be sent home on Thursdays. It will consist of a fun Maths and Literacy tasks. Please support your children in completing their homework, but DO NOT do their homework for them. It is vital for all round development that work is backed up at home!

Reading

Please help your child to change his or her book regularly and write it down in our folder. Please take a book from the colour book band your child is on. Changing 'book bands' is done in consultation with the teacher.

How Parent; can help

We would love to invite any parents or carers to come in and talk to the children about how they celebrate different festivals at home. You are also welcome to share a story at the beginning of the day! (8.45-9.00am) Please wait for a few weeks before coming in to help, so that your child is completely settled. Do come and talk to us if you would like to get involved.





Packed Lunches Guidance



Keeping Kosher and Being Healthy

Mosaic Jewish Primary is a Kosher School. The school provides hot lunches daily for children and these are paid for from Year 3 onwards unless you are entitled to pupil premium. If you are unsure if this applies to you, then please speak to a member of the office team.

On occasions, such as school trips you may be asked to provide your child with a packed lunch. We aim to be a healthy school, encouraging healthy choices.

- This must be a kosher vegetarian packed lunch.
- A range of fillings –such as egg, cheese, hummus or tuna release energy steadily throughout the afternoon enabling your child to have energy for learning throughout the afternoon.
- Fresh fruit is preferable.
- Please avoid chocolate biscuits, chocolate spread and sweets as they will not provide the optimum nutrition for learning.
- Fruit and cereal bars may contain nuts and as a nut free school we recommend for them not to be included in children's lunch boxes. This could be very serious for children with nut allergies.
- It should not include gelatine, any animal fats or shellfish and, if possible, should have a hechsher (marking it as kosher) for example:







or a symbol stating that it is suitable for vegetarians.







Please check all food that you bring into the School to ensure that it conforms to the rules of the school building.

Please check carefully as some common favourites (e.g.: *Smarties* and *Haribo*) contain animal extracts. If you are not sure, please check in the Kosher Nosh Guide or ask Miss Bear.

Uniform requirements

Reception through Year 4 should wear:

Royal blue MJPS school cardigan or school sweatshirt /knitted jumper Plain grey pinafore, skirt, shorts or trousers White or sky blue polo shirt (with MJPS school logo optional) White or grey socks/white or grey tights

Year 5 and 6 should wear:

White or blue button down shirt, short or long sleeves Knitted school cardigan or jumper with school logo School tie Plain grey pinafore, skirt, shorts or trousers

If your child is wearing a tie the jumper must be V-neck

Shoes: Strong lace-up, Velcro or buckled shoes in black (no trainers, boots or sandals)

Head coverings:

Girls are not required to cover their heads during prayers and blessing, but may wear a Kippah if they wish.

Boys are required to wear a Kippah during prayers and blessings. Kippot (skull caps) are available for purchase from the school office. Headscarves, if worn, should be plain royal blue, black, grey or white.

In summer, all girls may wear: A blue checked dress

In summer, all boys may wear: White or sky blue school polo shirt (MJPS logo, optional)

PE Kit:

Royal blue PE shorts or jogging bottoms

White or house colour t-shirt (MJPS logo, optional)

Plimsolls (without laces for younger children) or sensible trainers for outside

PE drawstring shoe bag for PE clothes (no large rucksacks)

General items: Plain coat or jacket in grey, black or navy

Other Recommended Optional Items with MJPS logo:

PE Bag, Book Bag, Backpack, Cap, Fleece, Reversible Jacket, Heavyweight Jacket

All items should be clearly named. Bags, clothes, shoes, etc.

Parsha Toldot

This week's Torah portion is Toldot. In the beginning of this parsha we learn that Rebecca is pregnant with twins. The twins struggle within her womb and she receives a prophecy from God that her sons will struggle for power and her younger son will become more powerful than her first born. Later in the portion Jacob, the younger son, pretends that he is Esau (the older son) in order to receive the blessing of the first born from their father Isaac. This section of the Torah has a lot of trickery and deceit and ultimately Esau and Jacob become distanced from one another. This parsha teaches us the importance of being honest and kind in relationships.

Question for discussion: How do you think Esau felt when Jacob tricked Isaac?

In year 1 this week we have been learning loads about addition in Maths. We are now beginning to put our part whole model knowledge into number sentences. We are doing so much hard work. In English we are finishing up our class story and now starting to plan to re write it for our big write. More on that next week. The children have been doing some Year 2 own similes about Plop the owl. They are incredible. In Jewish Learning we have been doing lots of camel art in relation to the story of Rebecca meeting Isaac after riding to Canaan on a camel. We are now also starting to practise for our Winter Show and this is very exciting!



In Year 2 we have been busy starting rehearsals for the Winter Show so there's been lots of fabulous singing and dancing! In English we watched some of our fantastic news reports we did for homework, polished our newspaper articles and have started learning about rhyming words in poetry. In Maths we have looked at the relation between 3+4=7 and 30+40=7 and we have completed our own challenges around this. In Science we have been learning about fire safety, ahead of burning our houses next week!



CISS (3)

This week in Maths Year 3 have been continuing column addition and subtraction and moving on from subtracting 2-digit numbers to 3-digit numbers. In English, we have started writing out the story of Hansel and Gretel making little changes and seeing how it will affect the ending. In Music we have been learning about different scales. We have also started rehearsing for our winter show! We have been practising the song we will be singing and adding dance moves.



Pomegranate Class 4

This week Year 4 have created our own Landias based on the book Weslandia. We have also started planning a brochure to persuade people to visit. In Maths we have investigating the perimeter around shapes and rectilinear shapes. We drew simple circuits using scientific symbols, and discussed the function of different components within a circuit. We have also started rehearsing for the Winter Show.



This week Year 5 have been becoming the teachers in Maths lessons, getting the chance to create their own Maths challenges thinking about what the difference is between the reasoning and problems solving tasks, asking ourselves what thinking skills do we need to draw on to solve problems like this. We have had a wonderful week in English describing and creating characters. We have used lots of techniques such as hot seating and mind mapping to, not only describe characters from our class novel but also following this process to create our own characters. We have also begun rehearsing for the winter show, singing, dancing, acting and building set and



Date Class 6

This week Year 6 have been looking at position and direction in Maths, focussing on translation and rotation. We have been looking at performance poetry in English, performing poems written by famous poets such as Michael Rosen and Benjamin Zephaniah, as well as our own compositions. In Ivrit (Hebrew), we have been looking at days of the week, subjects in school and how we can put these into a conversation. We have also been looking at what the NSPCC is and why we are raising money for them in our aerobics-a-thon next week!



Jewish Learnina



What twins were born this week in the Torah?





Throughput the year, we celebrate the Jewish festivals and holidays in line with the Jewish calendar. Below is an overview of the main features of the festivals and what activities your child might do whilst at school. Each week we celebrate Kabbalat Shabbat on a Friday and Havdalah on a Monday morning with classes being the hosts each week. We also mark other holidays/festivals that come up for other religions.

Kabbalat Shabbat



Each Friday half an hour before the school day closes, we teach the children how to bring in Shabbat. The classes take it in turns to be the hosts for the week and lead the blessings for lighting the candles, washing hands, wine (grape juice) and hallah (bread). We invite parents

to join us for this weekly event.

Havdalah



Each Monday morning we say goodbye to Shabbat and say the Havdalah blessing. We say the blessings for wine (grape juice), spices, light and dark and opposites. The children who hosted Shabbat also lead Havdalah.

<u>Autumn Term</u>

Rosh Hashanah



Rosh Hashanah is the Jewish New year or head of the year and we celebrate the birthday of the universe. During this holiday, the school is closed. We hear the sounding of the shofar, a ram's horn, to wake us up and start the year.

Activities might include hearing or sounding the shofar, dipping apples into honey, tasting pomegranates and making or eating round hallah. The children might also take part in a Tashlich, which means that they say good-bye to the bad things they have done at a large body of running water. (This is usually in Richmond Park.)

Yom Kippur



Yom Kippur is the holiest day of the year and when we are closest to God. It is the Day of Atonement. During this holiday, the school is closed and the day before we finish early in preparation as we abstain from food and drink on Yom Kippur.

Activities might include hearing or playing the different notes on the shofar, talking about things that we might be sorry about and learning about the special blessings.









Sukkot celebrates the gathering of the harvest in Israel. Sukkot is a weeklong holiday where the first two days are Yom Tov where work is forbidden. School is closed for these days. During Sukkot, we build a dwelling known as a Sukkah, which is covered with foliage. Meals are

had in the sukkah and it is usually decorated with fruits and vegetables.

Activities might include building the school sukkah, making decorations to hang in the sukkah, shaking the lulay, singing songs and hosting a lunch in the sukkah.

Shemini Atzeret and Simchat Torah



Following the seven joyous days of Sukkot, we celebrate Shemini Atzeret and Simchat Torah. The first day we sit and dwell in the sukkah but without a blessing. The second day is Simchat Torah, where we complete and begin the annual torah reading cycle.

Activities might include singing songs, hosting a lunch in the sukkah and starting the torah stories again.

Hanukkah



Hanukkah is an eight-day festival during the winter, which is also referred to as the festival of lights. The festival is celebrated with a nightly menorah lighting,

special prayer and eating of fried foods. The school stays open during this festival.

Activities might include: singing songs, learning about and making some of the foods, learning about the hanukkiah, making our own and retelling the story.





Spring Term

Tu B'Shevat



Tu B'Shevat is the birthday of trees. This is the 15th day of the Hebrew month of Shevat, known as Tu B'Shevat. During this holiday, we celebrate the some of the seven species of Israel, which include, wheat, barley, grape, fig, pomegranate, olives and dates.

Activities might include singing songs about trees, learning about the seven species, learning the blessings for fruit that grow on trees and for fruit that grow from the ground.

Purim



The festival of Purim commemorates the salvation of the Jewish people in ancient Persia from Haman's plot to kill the all the Jews. On this day, we read the Megilat Esther and make noises each time we hear Haman's name. We also celebrate with food parcels including Hamantaschen.

Activities might include dressing up as royalty or in other costumes, making Hamantaschen, creating food parcels or giving money to charity.

<u>Passover</u>



Passover celebrates the exodus from Egypt and the freedom from slavery that the Israelites experienced. During this time, anything that is leavened is avoided and Seder meals are had which include the special foods and the retelling of the exodus story.

Activities might include retelling the story of exodus, learning about the Seder plate, taking part in a mock Seder, making matza and learning the blessings.





Summer Term

Yom Ha'Shoah



Yom Ha'Shoah is holocaust memorial day. On this day we remember the victims of the holocaust and candles are lit in observance.

Activities might include learning about what happened during the holocaust, talking about being singled out and learning about famous people.

Lag B'Omer



Lag B'Omer marks the 33rd day of the Omer. After the exodus, Moses goes up to Mount Sinai to speak to God, the Jewish people begin to count 49 days when Moses will return. Lag B'Omer is the only day in the Omer when celebrations can take

place including parties, weddings and haircuts.

Activities might include learning about what we can do on Lag B'Omer, having a party, dressing up and having a bonfire.

Yom Ha'zikaron



Yom Ha'zikaron is Israel's Memorial Day. On this day, we remember the fallen soldiers who have fought for independence.

Activities might include learning about how we remember people who have died, talking about people we remember and looking at traditions.

Yom Ha'Atzmaut



Yom Ha'Atzmaut is Israel's Independence Day or Israel's birthday. It is celebrated by eating traditional Israeli food, Israeli dancing and singing songs.

Activities might include singing songs, learning Israeli dances, learning about the Israeli flag and learning about important Israeli people.

Shavuot



Shavuot is a two-day holiday and coincides with the date that God gave the Torah to the Jewish people at Mount Sinai. It comes 49 days after Passover and the preparation to receive the Torah. The school is closed on these days.

Activities might include learning the 10 commandments, listening to stories from the Torah, making and eating foods that involve dairy especially cheesecake.

GENERAL Q&A



When was Mosaic Jewish Primary School founded?

Mosaic was founded in 2013 and welcomed its first Reception pupils in September 2013.

How big is the school?

For its first two years, Mosaic had one new class each year. When the school moved to its permanent site in Roehampton in September 2015, the government asked the school to take two new classes each year (two-form entry). The school continues as a two-form entry. As of September 2019, Mosaic has 250 students in Reception to Year 6.

What type of school is Mosaic Jewish Primary School?

Mosaic is a free school. (All free schools are also academies.) It is a faith school that works with the local community and supports the school's ethos to offer an excellent education for all. We are proud to be the only Jewish primary school in south London serving all communities.

From where does Mosaic receive its funding?

Mosaic receives its funding directly from the Education and Skills Funding Agency ('ESFA'). This executive agency supports the Department for Education (DfE). Mosaic has the flexibility to work with a range of local authorities (eg Wandsworth, Merton, Kingston, Richmond, Hammersmith & Fulham) to ensure all pupils' funding needs are met.

Does Mosaic cost anything? Who is responsible for the running costs of the school?

As a state maintained primary school, Mosaic is a non-fee paying school. It is government funded and the maintenance is the responsibility of the Head Teacher, the school Governors and the school community. Like many schools, Mosaic relies on voluntary contributions from parents to further enhance the curriculum. These contributions are purely voluntary.

What official ratings has the school received?

In 2015, Ofsted awarded Mosaic the highest rating possible, "Outstanding." Since this latest inspection, each school year Mosaic has retained an outside consultant who has confirmed that the school has maintained its "Outstanding" rating. The school was also judged Outstanding in 2015 by Pikuach. (Pikuach is the only inspection service accredited by the Department for Education (DfE) to undertake inspections for religious education at Jewish schools.)

When is Mosaic's next Ofsted inspection going to take place?

Outstanding schools are currently exempt from routine inspection. Provided Mosaic continues to maintain its "Outstanding" standards we anticipate our next inspection to be in line with government guidance. The school will continue to employ an independent, outside consultant annually to monitor its development.

What does the school teach? Does it follow the National Curriculum?

Mosaic follows the National Curriculum guidelines so that all children will be well prepared to go into local secondary schools, both maintained and independent at age 11. Mosaic has an integrated Jewish Curriculum.

What does Mosaic mean when it talks about creative learning?

Mosaic believes that children are great learners and should be immersed in learning, both inside and outside the classroom. Mosaic strives to create individualised teaching experiences of awe and wonder. Teaching is topic-based, changing each term. The school believes in inspiring children with regular experiential day trips. These include visits to London's many museums, theatre, community and national events. In addition, the school holds regular workshops, inviting visitors into the school to enhance learning. Furthermore, pupils have opportunities to enter national and local competitions.

How much homework do Mosaic's pupils have to do?

Children are assigned age appropriate homework to enhance their learning. Weekly homework is focused on (1) Reading, (2) English, spelling and grammar, and (3) Maths, with topic-based homework opportunities throughout the year. In addition, we ask that all parents read to their children for a minimum of 15 minutes each day. The importance of reading to children cannot be overstated.

What specialist teaching provision does Mosaic offer?

Music is taught by a specialist teacher from Reception. In addition, musical instrument teaching (violin and piano) is provided from Year 1 upwards through the Wandsworth Music Trust. Modern Hebrew (Ivrit) is introduced from Reception by a specialist Hebrew teacher. PE is taught by a specialist teacher. In addition, the school offers further specialist teaching by organising a variety of Clubs for children (see below). The school recently opened a new Art, Design and Technology (ADT) room, which enhances specialist teaching for ADT.

What Clubs does Mosaic offer?

Mosaic offers both lunch-time and after-school clubs. These vary from term-to-term depending on parental and child interest. As the school continues to grow, so too will the clubs on offer. Lunch time clubs include/have included: Chess, French, Knitting. After school clubs include/have included: Football, Rugby, Tennis, Dance, Theatre, Choir, Mandarin, Spanish and Create-It.

Does Mosaic offer Special Educational Needs and Disabilities (SEND) teaching?

Yes. Jason Griffiths, SENDCO and Inclusion Teacher, is responsible for inclusion. Mosaic is committed to being an inclusive school, which means all children are welcome, regardless of needs and disabilities. The school works closely with parents of children with SEND. This includes identifying and supporting pupils who may be gifted and talented in particular curriculum areas.

What language(s) does the school offer?

Modern Hebrew (from Reception) is taught in the classroom. In addition, Mosaic currently offers school clubs for Spanish and French.

Is wrap-around/after-school care available?

Yes. Mosaic offers a breakfast club from 7:45 am, Monday through Friday. After-school care is available from 3:15 until 6:30 pm, Monday through Thursday. This is provided by Roehampton Rocks at an off-site location.

What are Mosaic's school hours?

Classrooms open from 8:45 am (Monday to Friday). We ask parents to ensure their children are in their classrooms as close to 8:45 as possible as teaching starts from 9:00 am. The school finishes at 3:15 pm (Monday to Friday). However, on Fridays during the winter months the school closes at 1:30pm (November to February) and 2:30pm (February to March).

Why does the school close early on Fridays during the winter?

As the Jewish Sabbath starts at dusk, in the winter months Mosaic closes early on Friday afternoons. This is to allow families to prepare and be ready for Shabbat when it starts early. The times for Friday closures for 2020–21 school year are:

Does Mosaic have normal school term dates and hours?

The school is open during normal school hours and the school year is divided into three terms. Mosaic fits around Wandsworth Council's school term dates as far as possible.

Does the school close for Jewish festivals?

Yes. The school is closed for major Jewish holidays as well as the usual Bank Holidays. Terms are organised to ensure that no child will miss out on school contact time over the academic year. Mosaic's calendar is published in plenty of time for parents to make alternative child care arrangements on the days the school is closed. Roehampton Rocks, Mosaic's after-school care provider, offers parents an off-site day camp, "Camp Rocks," when the school is closed for the Jewish festivals.

Are Free School Meals offered?

All pupils in Reception to Year 2 currently receive free school lunches through government funding. From Year 3, all families who are eligible for free school meals will continue to receive them. Those who do not fit this criterion pay the daily rate (currently £2.35) for hot school dinners.

What lunch does Mosaic provide?

Mosaic offers a family-style hot service lunch, which enables children to develop the Jewish values of hospitality, family and respect. At lunch, children serve each other lunch and dessert, and take responsibility for clearing cups, cutlery and plates. Mosaic aims to ensure that any special dietary or allergy requirements are accommodated.

Does Mosaic offer kosher food?

Mosaic operates a full-service kosher kitchen serving only hot, healthy, kosher food. All children have a vegetarian option, which also satisfies the requirements of halal food for Muslim students. There is a booklet issued to all families joining the school offering guidance about kosher food.

How much sport and physical activity do Mosaic children do each day?

Reception children have their own separate playground with open access throughout the majority of the school day. Reception children also begin each day with outdoor-based morning movement, which is dedicated time to physical exercise. Years 1–6 have physical movement breaks throughout the day, as this helps pupils to stay focused. All children have 1 hr a week PE teaching with a specialist PE teacher. In addition, children in Years 1–6 have break time twice a day. Lunch time and after school clubs provide additional opportunities for sport and physical activity.

What secondary schools will Mosaic pupils attend?

Mosaic strives to prepare all pupils for a successful secondary school transfer to the school of their choice. The school will support transitions for pupils and their families to secondary school. At the end of Year 4, parents are given information regarding secondary school transfers. This is followed up by an additional meeting with parents at the beginning of Year 5 to discuss the secondary school application process. Please refer to your Local Authority admissions guidance regarding secondary school applications.

Does Mosaic offer an Early Years Provision (commonly known as nursery provision)?

No.

What schools feed into Mosaic?

Mosaic is not affiliated with any particular Early Years programme. The majority of pupils come from local nurseries but a considerable number also come from surrounding local authorities.

Does the school have special security provisions?

Yes. The government provides extra security funding for Jewish schools through the Community Service Trust ('CST'). Mosaic is wholly committed to safeguarding pupils and has extra security personnel in line with CST guidance. The school has rigorous invac (internal evacuation) and external evacuation procedures.

TRANSPORT

How do I get to Mosaic?

We encourage parents to walk, cycle or use public transport to come to the school. Via public transport, the school is well accessed by local buses from Putney, Wimbledon, Southfields, Barnes, Richmond and Kingston. Buses also run from the local Barnes and Putney stations to the school. The six buses serving the school at Roehampton Lane are the 72, 85, 170, 265, 430 and 493. Parking is available, subject to restrictions, on local streets. Some short-term parking is also available at Roehampton University with prior permission.

Is there a car sharing scheme?

Many of our parents carpool. Car sharing is a parent-led initiative to which Mosaic lends its full support, however for insurance reasons the school is not permitted to co-ordinate this. Like many schools we encourage parents to consider car sharing schemes in line with current local authority transport policy such as Wandsworth's School Travel Plan initiative.

JUDAISM

Does Mosaic teach Jewish history, festivals and practice?

Yes, as a Jewish faith school the entire ethos of Mosaic is grounded in Jewish values and texts. Judaism permeates into the general curriculum and is enriched by following themes from the many cycles of the Jewish Year. The whole school community is involved in living these universal values through social action projects, caring for the environment, respecting and valuing each other. Cultural Judaism also enriches the curriculum through art, music, drama, literature and much more.

Do all children participate in the Jewish learning curriculum?

Jewish Studies is integrated into the curriculum from Reception and all children learn about Jewish festivals, as well as the festivals of other faiths. For example, in December 2016, all students participated in a special holiday show, "How the Grinch Stole Chrismakawali!" to help celebrate Christmas, Hanukkah and Diwali.

Are there daily prayers?

The school's collective worship is inclusive so that pupils can participate or reflect as appropriate to their beliefs. Every Friday afternoon, pupils and parents gather together for a special 'Kabbalat Shabbat' ceremony to welcome the traditional day of rest (Sabbath). This is a distinctive feature of life at Mosaic which often attracts many family members and visitors. On Monday mornings, pupils observe Havdalah in a school-wide assembly to say 'goodbye' to Shabbat.

Do boys wear kippot (skull caps)?

Kippot are part of Mosaic's required uniform. Boys are expected to wear kippot only during prayers. Some children may choose to wear kippot throughout the day. Girls may also wear kippot if they wish.

Does the school teach an orthodox stream of Judaism or a liberal one?

Mosaic is a cross-communal faith school welcoming pupils of all religions, beliefs and none. The school is not aligned to a particular strand of Judaism. Mosaic's approach, when discussing all faith traditions and practice, is for teachers to ask "What does your family do?" They will then discuss differing experiences and practices. The Mosaic community is very diverse and importantly inclusive. This is why practices, such as early closure in the winter on Fridays, have been implemented as they respect all levels of observance.

Are other faiths taught at the school?

Yes, the teaching of other major world faiths is part of the R.E. (religious education) curriculum and leads to our children having a clearer understanding of and respect for different faiths and cultures.

Does the school teach about Israel?

Yes, the school teaches about Israel and about a range of other countries over the seven years of a child's life at Mosaic.

Are there mezuzahs on doorways?

Yes. (A mezuzah is a parchment inscribed with a biblical passage which is attached to the doorpost of a room.)

Are boys required to wear tzitzit (ritual fringes) at school?

This is not part of the school uniform but boys are able to wear tzitzit at Mosaic if they so choose.

Are boys taught about wearing tefillin (a daily prayer ritual)?

At the age of 12, after leaving primary school, it is traditional, in orthodox streams of Judaism, for boys to start laying tefillin. Should parents seek support in locating a suitable teacher for this once they have left the school, Mosaic is happy to offer appropriate guidance or contacts.

APPLICATIONS

Who can apply?

The school is open to children of all faiths, beliefs and none.

Is it possible to transfer my child(ren) to Mosaic?

Yes. Mosaic has a limited number of places available in Reception to Year 6 for the 2020-2021 school year. Please contact the school Admissions team to discuss availability and the transfer process at admissions@mjps.org.uk.

Will my child get in?

The admissions criteria are: 50% faith places and 50% open places for the local communities.

How do I apply to the school?

Mosaic Jewish Primary School is included in Wandsworth Local Authority's Admissions process for allocating pupils to schools. For faith applications, please request an application form directly from the Admissions team at admissions@mjps.org.uk.
