How we have approached risk estimation and management

The DfE advises that you take the following approach (in this order) to reducing risks in your school:

- 1. Eliminations if an activity isn't considered essential and has risks attached, stop it
- 2. **Substitutions** replace the activity with one that reduces the risk. Take care not to substitute the activity with one that'll introduce new hazards.
- 3. Engineering controls: introduce measures that help control or mitigate risk
- 4. Administrative controls: identify and implement the procedures to improve safety (for example, by having markings on the floor or signage around school)
- 5. Having gone through this process, use PPE where the guidance advises it is required

Respond to risks in a way that's appropriate for your school's circumstances. For each risk, consider whether there are measures in each of the above steps that you can adopt before moving onto the next step.

Make sure you consult the right people

Talk to:

- Independent legal experts
- Your insurance providers
- Your staff, particularly any union representatives and remember that you'll also need to provide your staff with any training they need on how to implement the measures vou're taking (e.g. changes to behaviour rules, how to dispose of PPE)

RAG rate your control measures

Mark up each control measure in the appropriate colour, to make it clear how prepared you are for each measure being in place for the autumn term.

- Red: this measure cannot be put in place in our school
- Amber: this measure isn't in place yet, but can be in place for the autumn term
- Green: this measure is already in place

Regular reminders will be given about this. Anyone self-isolating with symptoms will be encouraged to access testing and engage with the NHS Test and Trace process. If a symptomatic person comes into school, they will be sent home immediately or isolated until they can be picked up. Contact dedicated first aider (LN) PPE will be used to approach individual and they will be taken to the community room. 999 will be called if they are seriously ill or injured or their life is at risk. In the case of a symptomatic pupil who needs to be supervised before being picked up: If a distance of 2m can't be maintained, supervising staff will wear a fluid-resistant surgical mask If contact is necessary, supervising staff will also wear disposable gloves and a disposable apron If there's a risk of splashing to the eyes, such as from coughing, spitting or vomiting, supervising staff will also wear eye protection Supervising staff will wash their hands thoroughly for 20 seconds after the pupil has been picked up. 		Only in exceptional circumstances will staff take symptomatic children home themselves, and in this case one of the following steps will be taken:			
		 Use of a vehicle with a bulkhead (i.e. the driver is in a separate compartment to any passengers); or 			
		 The driver and passenger will maintain a distance of 2m from each other; or 			
		 The driver will use PPE (the same PPE as when supervising a symptomatic pupil, as explained above) and the passenger will wear a face mask if they are old enough and able to do so 			
		If a parent or carer insists that a pupil with symptoms attends school, the school will use reasonable judgement and refuse the child if this is necessary to protect pupils and staff. The school will consider all circumstances and the latest public health advice when making this decision.			
		A deep clean will take place in the areas that the symptomatic person has been in, and PPE will be disposed of properly, following <u>decontamination</u> <u>guidance</u> .			
		If the school becomes aware that a pupil or a staff member has tested positive for coronavirus, the school will contact the DfE helpline on 9800 046 8687 and select			
		option 1 for advice. The advice service (or <u>local health</u> <u>protection team</u> , if the call is escalated to them), will carry out a rapid risk assessment to confirm who's been in close contact with the person when infectious. The school will ask (using a template letter from the local health			
		protection team) these people to self-isolate for 14 days from the day they were last in close contact.

		Anyone wearing reusable face coverings when arriving to school will be expected to bring a plastic bag to keep these in during the school day. If they're using disposable face coverings, these will be put in a covered bin.				
		Anyone wearing any sort of face covering when arriving to school will wash their hands on arrival (as all individuals will), dispose of/store the covering, and wash their hands again before going to their classroom or office.				
		Everyone will be made aware that they mustn't touch the front of the covering during use or removal.				
		Staff and visitors will wear face coverings in areas of the school where social distancing isn't possible, such as in staffrooms. They will be asked to keep on or put on a face covering when arriving at school and moving to classrooms or offices, unless they're exempt from wearing one. Once they've arrived at their destination and need to take the covering off, they'll follow the above steps. A supply of spare face coverings will be kept for anyone who arrives without one or has one that's unsafe to wear.

		 Clean their hands on arrival, after breaks, if they change rooms, before and after eating, and after sneezing or coughing Be encouraged not to touch their mouth, eyes and nose Use a tissue or elbow to cough or sneeze, and use bins for tissue waste Pupils will be encouraged to learn and practise these habits in lessons and by posters put up across the school. Help will be available for any pupils who have trouble cleaning their hands independently. Skin friendly cleaning wipes can be used as an alternative. 		Items that need laundering (e.g. towels, costumes flannels) will be washed regularly in accordance with the manufacturer's instructions, on the warmest water setting. These items will not be shared between children between washes.			
		Pupils and parents/carers will be asked to limit the amount of equipment they bring into school each day to essentials like bags, lunch boxes, hats, coats, books, stationery and mobile phones.			
		Areas of the school that are used by pupils will be cleaned thoroughly at the end of the day. Each class will be allocated specific areas for their bubbles e.g. allocated toilets and sinks.			
		Areas of the school not in use will be shut off to make cleaning more manageable.			
		Any resources shared between groups, such as sports, art and science equipment, will be either:

		The same rules will be followed for books and other shared resources that pupils or staff take home. However, unnecessary sharing will be avoided, especially where it doesn't contribute to pupil education and development.			
		Individual and very frequently used equipment, like pens and pencils, will not be shared.			
		Therapy equipment, such as physiotherapy or sensory equipment, will be cleaned between each use. If this is not possible or practical, it will be:			
		Restricted to one user; or			
		 Rotated so it can be unused for 48 hours (72 hours for plastics) between use by different individuals 			
		Shared rooms, such as halls and dining areas, will be cleaned between different groups using them.			
		If a person with coronavirus symptoms comes into school, a deep clean will take place in the areas that the person has been in, following decontamination guidance.			
		Cleaning supplies will be topped up regularly and monitored to make sure they're not close to running out.

staff in lessons		Pupils will be seated side-by-side and facing forwards, and unnecessary furniture will be moved out of classrooms to allow for this.			
		We will follow the government's <u>guidance</u> for lessons involving drama, singing, chanting, shouting or playing instruments (particularly wind or brass instruments). These will take place outside wherever possible. If taking place inside, larger, well-ventilated rooms will be used and the number of people will be limited to allow for social distancing.			
		Any background or accompanying music will be kept to levels which don't require teachers or other performers to raise their voices if they don't have to. Microphones will be used to avoid the need for shouting or prolonged periods of loud speaking or singing. Where possible, microphones, instruments or other equipment won't be shared.			
		During music lessons and performances, pupils will be positioned either back-to-back or side-to-side at an appropriate distance. Singing or instrument playing will only take place in assemblies if there's enough natural airflow and space to allow for strict social distancing between each person (at least 10l/s/person natural airflow for all present, including audiences).			
		For physical activity, we will follow the same guidance for cleaning equipment and grouping pupils as in all areas of the school. Outdoor sports will be prioritised where possible, - where it is not, we'll use large indoor spaces with sufficient ventilation. Distance between pupils will be maximised as much as possible.

		For team sports, we will follow the <u>return to recreational</u> <u>team sport framework</u> . For individual sports, we will follow the <u>guidance</u> on the phased return of sport and recreation.			
		Staff can work across different groups in order to deliver the school timetable, but they will keep their distance from pupils and other staff as much as they can (ideally 2 metres apart). This won't always be possible, particularly when working with younger children, but close face-to-face contact will be avoided, and time spent within 1 metre will be minimised.			
		Any pupils with complex needs or who need close contact care will have the same support as normal as distancing isn't possible here. Staff will be rigorous about hand washing and respiratory hygiene.			
		Supply teachers, peripatetic teachers and other temporary staff will be told to minimise contact and maintain as much distance as possible from other staff. The number of temporary staff entering the school premises will be kept to a minimum.			
		Specialists, therapists, clinicians and other support staff for pupils with SEND should provide interventions as usual. These staff will be advised to be rigorous about hand washing and respiratory hygiene.			
		If the school becomes part of a local lockdown area where tier 4 restrictions apply, we will move to remote learning for all pupils except for vulnerable pupils and children of critical workers, who will be asked to attend school full-time.

to excessive contact and mixing between pupils and staff around and outside of the school		Everyone will be asked to put on face coverings when moving around the school, unless they're exempt from wearing one. Staff and visitors will wear face coverings in areas of the school where social distancing isn't possible, such as in staffrooms. They will be asked to keep on or put on a face covering when arriving at school and moving to classrooms or offices, unless they're exempt from wearing one. They'll be given clear instructions about how to put on, remove and store/dispose of face coverings safely. For pupils who routinely attend other settings on a parttime basis, such as an alternative provision setting, the school will work with these other settings to work out a system to keep these pupils safe. Pupil groups will have staggered timetables, including for start and finish times, break and lunch times, and assemblies, to avoid too many pupils being in one place at the same time. Please see each class timetable and lunch time timetables. Movement around the school site will be kept to a minimum to avoid creating busy corridors. Classes will use a range of exits to reduce corridor flow. Please see Corona virus handbook September 2020. Pupils will be supervised at all times to ensure mixing between groups doesn't occur, and they will be reminded about the rules throughout the day. 		Toilet use will be managed to avoid crowding. Each class has an allocated toilet block. Staff use of staff rooms and offices will be staggered to limit occupancy. Staff in different key stages will be allocated different break out areas. Visitors to the site, such as contractors, will have guidance on physical distancing and hygiene explained to them on or before arrival. Visits will happen outside of school hours wherever possible. A record will be kept of all visitors. Non-overnight domestic educational visits can take place in the same pupil groups, but only subject to a separate risk assessment that considers the coronavirus measures in place at the destination. Breakfast club and afterschool clubs will be limited to a maximum number of pupils (15). Afterschool clubs will be carried in bubble groups only.			
Spreading infection due to the school environment		Checks to the premises will be done to make sure the school is up to health and safety standards before opening in September. Fire, first aid and emergency procedures will be reviewed to make sure they can still be followed with limited staff and changes to how the school space is being used. Areas in use will be well ventilated by opening windows or using ventilation units. Doors will be propped open, where fire safety and safeguarding wouldn't be compromised. The use of lifts will be avoided unless essential. Lidded bins will be provided in classrooms and other key locations to dispose of tissues and any other waste. If the guidance is paused, all staff and pupils are expected to come into school, apart from staff who can continue to work from home (e.g. some admin staff). Staff who are clinically vulnerable or clinically extremely vulnerable and coming into school will be placed in the safest possible on-site roles where it's possible to maintain social distancing.
